Most progressive-rock fans may know Emerson Lake & Palmer's classic 1974 album, Welcome Back My Friends To The Show That Never Ends.

Tom Gagliardi knows it backward and forward.

Saturday, Gagliardi went on the air with his 1,000th show.

He celebrated the milestone with an expanded, eight-hour broadcast that included some previous interviews he'd done with Jan Hammer, who com-Vice TV series, and Tony Banks,

The 34-year-old Gagliardi never planned on hosting a 1,000th edition of Gagliarchives.

"In 1997, I hosted a concert at the TLA Theater in Philadelphia, and someone had asked me if *Gagliarchives* would last for 1,000 shows," said Gagliardi, of Maple Shade. "At that point, I had no idea how long it would

"Each week I do the show is a blessing — and I don't take it for granted," he said.

Gagliardi became a fan of progressive rock — a genre known for its classical music-in-

tive lyrics — at age 12. "My sister bought me Genesis' Invisible Touch album, and

that got me hooked," he said.
A graduate of Maple Shade High School, Gagliardi began his radio career in 1991 while attending Camden County College

in Blackwood. He received his first on-air exposure while working at the college's radio station, WDBK-91.5 FM. He created and started

hosting Gagliarchives while at His radio show soon developed a strong following and caught the attention of Burlington County College's faculty and

student body, who were planning to launch a station. In 1994, while the station was being built, Gagliardi joined the college's fledgling radio staff. In January 1995, WBZC went on

the air, and so did Gagliarchives. It continues to be a popular show, and Gagliardi, who works a full-time job as a supervisor's assistant at PHH Mortgage in Mount Laurel, has high hopes for its future.

He said that he's pursuing the prospect of having satellite radio stations, such as Sirius or

"Every Saturday night that Gagliarchives is on, the phones are constantly ringing — we get constant calls from listeners wanting to make song requests," said Holcomb, from Delran.

"Tom's listeners are as devoted as viewers of American Idol," he said, "and his show continues to enhance the diversity of programming that we try to offer."
